What is the SSDS Report and why is it essential?



Student Safety Data System (SSDS)

By law, all N.J. public school districts (including charter schools) must use the Student Safety Data System (SSDS) to report all incidents of violence, vandalism, weapons, substance abuse, and HIB incidents that occur in their schools.

- In 2016, the SSDS replaced the Electronic Violence and Vandalism Reporting System (EVVRS).
- It also replaced the Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying Investigations, Trainings, and Programs (HIB-ITP) system.
- School districts are **still required** to report bullying incidents to the New Jersey Department of Education (by October 31st) through the self-assessment rubric.

Incident category totals may differ from total incidents due to multiple offenses selected for one incident. i.e., student may have multiple offenses for one incident.



Important SSDS terms (cont.)

o HIB Alleged

An allegation of HIB that was investigated by the school, and:

- 1) was found to be HIB but the Board of Education rejected the determination and did not confirm as HIB, or
- 2) was not found to be HIB and the Board of Education affirmed that the offense was not HIB.

o HIB Confirmed


An allegation of HIB that was investigated by the school, found to be HIB and affirmed by the Board of Education as a confirmed HIB offense.



HIB - Offense Categories






Physical:

Types of Verbal Offenses




Statewide HIB Data 21/22 SY



2021-2022 SY:

There were 7,672 investigations that were found to be HIB







- There's no significant difference in discipline numbers when looking at Period 1 data between the 22/23 SY and the 23/24 SY outside of alleged HIB cases.
- 23/24 Period 1 HIB data showed zero incidents involving violence, i.e., fighting or physical altercations.
- ISS & OSS suspension data does show that a third of those incidents involves some type of physical altercation (fighting, inappropriate touching, excessive horseplay, etc.).
- How students speak to each other still remains a key challenge as Verbal harassment made up 100% of the confirmed HIB cases for Period 1.




The **Week of Respect** presents a valuable opportunity to enhance the overall atmosphere and environment within the District.








STOPit™ Incident Report Data







Continual Improvement:

- Student use of inappropriate language (verbal occurrences), particularly in the area of cyberbullying and the appropriate use of social media platform still continue to be a challenge. We should continue to strengthen our school culture in theses areas through educational programs & initiatives, speakers and parent workshops. These efforts will of course be aligned with our strategic planning initiatives for enhancing climate and culture district-wide.
- A targeted effort was made to enhance HIB training district-wide for the 2022-2023 and 2023-2024 school years. Moving forward, we will further emphasize training for all contracted employees and volunteers, and also give more attention to other areas such as maintenance & custodial.

Expectations for 2023-24 & Next steps...



Data Recording/Documentation:

- The focus will remain on maintaining accuracy in reporting, transparency in communication, and ensuring consistency across all reporting channels.
- Utilizing HIBster to monitor investigations related to HIB or Code of Conduct is essential. However, it is important to ensure that these incidents are accurately documented in HIBster and reported in PowerSchool. This process helps administrators and support staff accurately document incidents in SSDS.

Professional Development:

- Continued focus on training for staff and administrators on Code of Conduct implementation, HIB reporting and investigation, and data reporting;
- Previously, the District offered Harassment, Intimidation, and Bullying (HIB) training for parents that covered the definition of HIB, the HIB policy, and parental rights. Unfortunately, there was low participation in these outreach efforts. Moving forward, we can explore additional strategies to engage parents in training sessions as we prepare for future school years.
